History of Butley Ferry

The ferry has been operating from its present site since 1383 and is one of only two in Britain under working oars alone. Prior



to the dissolution of the monasteries under Henry VIII, the land on both sides of the Butley River was owned and farmed by the canons and estate workers of the Augustinian Priory. The remains of Butley Priory can be found nearby. The ferry is known to have been in operation at its present site for some of the time that the priory was active but had previously operated from a place approximately where Boyton Dock now stands.

Overlooking the ferry is Burrow Hill, an Iron Age and Saxon settlement site. Before the Medieval flood defences were built, it was a virtual island surrounded by local streams. A community excavation found evidence of a Bronze Age cremation cemetery, early Christian burials and a defensive site dating from the 7th to 9th centuries AD.

The ferry became less important to the local economy and went out of service around the early 1930's. It was revived in 1993 to serve the walkers

> and cyclists who have now discovered this beautiful part of Suffolk.


